In May I had the opportunity to volunteer in the Quilts of Valour™ booth at the Quilt Canada Show in Vancouver, BC. It was an amazing experience. I had never attended such a large quilt show or been able to participate in one of our booths with other QOVC™ reps. I learned a lot in a short time.

I'm a relatively new representative, having just signed on last August. As the QOVC™ rep for the Yukon I'm a bit of a "one man band" and a long way from all of you. For me, the opportunity to meet reps from other parts of the country, put names to faces, and share experiences and ideas was just too good to pass up.....plus Vancouver promised spring weather and flowers, which were still a ways off at home.

"Having served in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) as an Intelligence Operator for nearly 8 years, I'm a soon-to-be (medically) retired veteran.

I'll be presented with a very special Quilt of Valour on June 15th. Quilts of Valour are handmade by people across the country who share a deep affection for the ill and injured among our men and women in uniform. In many cases, these folks have a personal connection to the CAF, and oftentimes, they mourn the loss of someone in uniform.

I, myself, was born at Sick Kids just over 40 years ago. Mom and I nearly didn't make it. But, thanks to Sick Kids, we did!

I know that Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) Toronto serves as a "home away from home" for families from across the country, and indeed, from around the world, with seriously ill children undergoing treatment at Sick Kids. More than that – I know that you offer these families comfort and a sense of security during a time when, I'm sure, it must feel like their entire world is falling apart at the seams.

Why am I writing to you? Because, in short, I'd like to donate my Quilt of Valour to your 81-family House, or to the RMHC Family Room on the 4th floor of Sick Kids.

"Sometimes a non-physical injury is a very strange darkness. You cannot see it and neither can anyone else; so you know instantly that you are on your own. It remains uncontrolled and unseen so you cannot find it, you cannot fight it and you cannot kill it.

You feel shame, fragmented and beaten. Mostly confused. You can't actually look at it to discern any physical improvements or assess any changes over time. You haven't any skills for this kind of examination, so you withdraw from the entire world, which is now deemed to be against you - but mostly you now know you are unconnected to folks who might otherwise try to care or try to understand. For the others who try to understand the incidents that lead you into this darkness; They do not go, so they simply do not know. You cannot reconcile this either for them.

Then someone comes along, and wants nothing for it, and just believes in you. They want you to feel better, they want to hug you and they want to be connected. For me, that is my puppy, Sparkles. The entire world versus me. Bad odds. But with my puppy, I suppose I can live with those odds.

One day, your career is over. You are offered paperwork, a handshake, cookies and a little speech on your last day. Gone is your sense of self identification. You're afraid you and your puppy aren't strong enough for whatever fate awaits you.

Then, for some reason. A simple, beautiful quilt and a hug from a stranger is offered to you. The persons who made it, are not there. They will likely never meet you. They do not know my injuries or story. They just believe in what I was doing and now have laboured to produce this extremely random article of kindness, exemplifying creation, care and incredible patience. It is brutally disarming for you. A group of women that you have never met, wants to make sure you are both warm and hugged; these women want nothing for it. You don't understand, but you sort of feel something for a change could it be this ridiculously simple? This hug will wait for me to come home, it will never judge me, it will keep my puppy and I warm if I need it to; and it will always give me a good memory. It will always want to be connected to me. It will always want to go on the road with me.

Now I have a tiny family. Myself, my Sparkles and my quilted hug. The entire world versus my tiny family. My odds are better. I'm getting a little stronger.

I'm ashamed that I do not know who a "quilted by a Southern Albertan and N. Christie' are. I'd like to think they are a couple of Ladies passing the time by having a good chat, working the fabric and building the patterns - being connected with friends as they do this. I haven't any idea exactly what this kind of poetry called quilting entails nor what the tools required are. I haven't any ideas if it is hard artwork or just a task of love to pass the time. However, I would hope they know somehow - they are helping to arm me in my fight. They are killing darkness.

Please understand, people will ask, "what's the story with that bloody quilt, Bud?" I won't say a word. Not a thing. They won't understand. That one I'll keep between the wonderful Ladies in southern Alberta that I have never met - and my tiny family.

In the end, I feel I cannot articulate my thoughts and feelings properly nor can I even begin to justify them; but I feel like I do have a small connection to the country and the good folks inside her borders, once again. That too, makes me a little bit stronger. The odds are getting better.

As I am most appreciative, I can only offer in return my sincerest gratitude to those few anonymous Ladies who toiled, so that on some random day, I could be properly equipped when needing a real hug from somewhere deep inside Canada.

I remain most gratefully, Yours Aye."

A Quilted Hug from Across the Nation



The 2018 Hug Blocks were revealed this spring at the Creativ Festival in Mississauga, ON and at Quilt Canada in Vancouver, BC. The blocks are coming in as the quilters are making up the blocks and sets of blocks are already

going out the door to be made into a quilted "Hug From Across the Nation". This year's pattern/fabric kits are available through several QOVC™ Representatives and at quilt shows across the country whenever permission is given. Block patterns are also available on the website under the Hug Blocks tab.

Blocks from across the country (and some from beyond our borders) arrive at one location where their sender and quantity are recorded. Blocks are then re-packed into sets of 30, or as requested and mailed out to a quilter or group of quilters who then will put the blocks together as they wish, as long as our quilt construction criteria are observed. The quilt can then be directed to the group's nearest QOVC™



representative who will present the quilted hug made by quilters from across Canada.

For those who are new to our society, the Hug Block program started in 2012. In 2010, Northcott Fabrics was approached to consider designing a line of Canadiana fabric that could be used in QOV™ quilts. Northcott representatives, *Deborah Edwards & Patti Carey* became involved and fabrics were designed and



ordered. They also arranged for sponsorship of our society through their VP, with Northcott preparing brochures, banners, and several other promotional items. After two years working with Northcott Fabrics in Ontario, Northcott participated at the spring Creative Stitches show in Victoria, BC and have been a huge sponsor at all our shows. Pictured to the left – Marilyn Fuller and Deborah Edwards (Northcott)

Ontario quilter, Bill Bartlett approached Northcott after learning about the new project and had an

idea to have a block exchange from the different regions across the country. He wrote "Maybe at the Halifax show you could see if there is interest in this idea. I can only imagine how touched a Canadian soldier would be in getting a quilt with blocks from different areas of the country and a short note from the maker."

After consulting with Northcott, the idea of Hug Blocks became a reality, and a response was sent to Bill "Thank you Bill. What we will go with will not be a block exchange... It will be a block making extravaganza using only the 9 fabrics in the Stonehenge Oh Canada line. With everyone using the same fabric, the blocks will all go together very well." Our newsletter that November revealed the concept to everyone, encouraging the making of blocks out of the specific fabric and putting them into "Hugs from across the nation".

There were no specific block patterns in the beginning, and hundreds of different blocks arrived. We continue to receive many "individual" blocks too!

Hug In A Mug – Hug Block fundraiser



In 2014, Quilt Canada was held in St. Catharines, ON. The QOV booth revealed a fundraising project "Hug in a Mug". Specific block patterns were designed, and the fabric pieces were included in a wrapped Canadiana coffee mug. They went off the booth table so fast that the volunteers had to scramble after the first day to prepare more! It was an instant success, and

as the quilters returned home, everyone wanted to know more about how to get the mug and the fabric kit!

The mug fundraiser continued its popularity until the source of the mugs was no longer available. It was a very successful fundraiser, and quilters continue to ask for the mugs.

We have found other "gifts" to go with the Hug Block pattern, and each year new block patterns are added to the selection.

Hug Blocks on the Website

Since October 2012, over 4,700 blocks have been received and redistributed. 173 quilts have been registered, made and presented or being made from the blocks.

We try to maintain a consistent pattern format and offer a range of patterns from easy for the beginner quilter to more complex for advanced quilter who likes a challenge.

The concept of using only the Northcott Stonehenge Oh Canada line of fabric is crucial to the quilts' make up. With various and random blocks arriving at quilt makers' doors, the blocks will work together because they are of the same line of fabric. Finishing the quilt is at the discretion of the maker, and can be made from the quilters' collections of fabrics. Sashing can be added, the blocks can be put on point, borders can be added. A 30-block set can become two or three quilts if panels are added. Extra blocks of the quilt makers' choice can become part of the quilted hug. Northcott has added to the range of options with the addition of Canadiana panels and an extended range of fabrics, while maintaining the Oh Canada coordinating theme.

Block kits are always a draw to our booth and a great conversation starter to encourage participation in Quilts of Valour − Canada™. Representatives who have presented Hug Block quilts can attest; they see the reaction of the recipients as one of surprise and the soldier is truly touched as they comment on many of the locations noted on the blocks − places they were posted, worked, met their spouse. Many stories are shared from the "Quilted Hug from Across the Nation".

"Our store — Along Came Quilting - became involved with Quilts of Valour in 2011. At the time, we carried the Northcott "Oh Canada" line of fabric, from which a portion of the sale goes to supporting this organization. When Sandy Carlile told us she had a group of ladies sewing for QofV, we offered our classroom for them to meet, plan, and sew in a space specially designed for this purpose. There would be no need for any particular member to host the group in her home, or for them to need to bring irons, boards, tables, etc. to a community hall. Offering our classroom to them free of charge was one of the ways we could easily assist them, as well as providing a bin for people to drop off finished quilts or donations, and informing our customers through our emails and classroom calendar of their activities. Their support of our injured Canadian Forces members is outstanding and we are awed by their work."

Quilt of Valour™ Specifications

Minimum Size is 55" X 70"

A Quilt of Valour™ is a "hug from the nation" to an injured Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) Member or honoured Veteran who has served and made sacrifices for our country. The quilt standards must reflect the level of gratitude that we want to demonstrate to the recipient. Quilts of Valour™ can be made by individuals, social groups or quilting bees. In all cases we request that the standards we have established are followed to ensure that a high quality symbol of gratitude is presented. When you give a completed Quilt of Valour™ it speeds delivery to a CAF member.

A Canadiana theme is a good choice. We have seen many maple leaf quilts and they are stunning! The red/white or traditional looking patterns always work but are not a must. Please select fabric patterns that are suitable for a CAF member, choose colours and patterns carefully.

Quality in workmanship is a must. Please select 100% high quality cotton and ensure the sewing is going to stand up to repeated washings, tuggings and huggings. Cut off any loose threads as non-quilters will pull them out and maybe even the seam too.

Tied and rag quilts will not be accepted. No re-purposed fabrics or prints unsuitable for adults.

The official Quilts of Valour™ label represents a tribute that is recognized by the CAF members. CAF members look for this label as they are familiar with what it represents.

No alterations or additions should be made to the label.

Quilt of Valour™ Eligibility Criteria

Canadian Armed Forces members, past or present, who are ill or injured as a result of their service to Canada, qualify for a Quilt of Valour $^{\text{TM}}$.

Our first priority is to supply the Integrated Personnel Support Centers (IPSC) across Canada. The IPSC assist us by presenting Quilts of Valour $^{\text{IM}}$ (QOV $^{\text{IM}}$) to service members currently being medically discharged, who have incurred visible or invisible injuries as a result of their service.

Some examples of members who automatically qualify for a QOV™ are those who served in: WWII, Korea, Bosnia, Rwanda, and the Gulf Wars. There are many other areas of violent conflicts/theatres of war (e.g. Afghanistan), peacekeeping missions and general regular/reserve duty in which members, past and present, may have suffered injury/illness as a result of their service, including duty within Canada and abroad.

Members, past or present, are eligible to receive only one QOV™.

If you have a request and are not sure if the individual qualifies, please contact the Regional Representative closest to you for assistance.



Where has QOVC[™] been and what have we been doing?

Ottawa, Ontario QOVC™, represented by Robbie Chapman,



Jacquie Fuller and Nancy Arbogast had the honour to present quilts to two retired military members at their home in Osgoode, Ontario. Sgt (ret'd) Jill Tubbs and MWO (ret'd) Rick Tubbs both served a long and varied careers with a wide variety of postings including missions in Afghanistan, Bosnia, Cyprus and Golan Heights. Sitting in the tranquility of their beautiful garden, it is hard to fathom some of the difficult situations they have witnessed. Both of them expressed sincere gratitude for the quilts. As they said

themselves, they were "just doing their jobs". In truth, they were doing a very difficult, very important job, that few of us would want to do.
