This month QoV - Canada is pleased to introduce to you Julie Poirier Mathur, our Quebec representative.

Julie grew up “franco-ontarienne” in Cornwall, ON, moved to Montreal to attend Concordia University and settled there. She now lives in Beaconsfield, QC with her husband of 18 years and their two sons.

Julie spent 8 years in the Canadian Reserves - Royal Montreal Regiment (Westmount, QC) and 11th Field Artillery Regiment (Guelph, ON).. She spent some time with Parks Canada until starting her family, at which point she decided to try a career as a full time mommy. Now she is a stay-at-home mom and a career-volunteer.

She dabbled in stained glass art for a while, then discovered quilting in 2002. Now she designs her own quilted projects, as well as teaching and lecturing locally about the history and advancement of art quilts in Canada and her own creative process. She and her family enjoy traveling, camping, kayaking, and winter sports. Her husband is from India and they have traveled there several times.



Julie has exhibited several award winning pieces in various juried and invitational exhibitions including *Quilts: a World of Beauty in Houston* in 2009 (Green Pear); all provincial Salons of Courtepointe Quebec Quilts since 2004; *World Piece - Quilts from Near and Far*; Quilt Festival 2005 in Waterloo, ON, at the Musée des Maitres et Artisans du Quebec in 2006, as well as countless exhibitions with the Beaconsfield Quilters' Guild. She also enjoys leading group projects with other artists from her guild (Guitar Blues, 2011). Here she divided a photo into sections and asked each participant to reconstruct their own piece in blue, then reassembled the pieces to see the original image again.





Hugs From Across the Nation

Northcott designer Linda Ludovico created the fabric collection OH CANADA in support of Quilts of Valour – Canada. Nine fabrics are in this Stonehenge line - and Quilts of Valour – Canada is inviting quilters across the country to make a block (or two, or more) from this line. Northcott is sponsoring Quilts of Valour – Canada through the sales of this line.



Blocks must be 8 1/2" UNfinished; UNWASHED; any pattern, any design. ONLY the OH CANADA Stonehenge line of fabric from NORTHCOTT© *must* be used for the block. Save your other fabrics for another great quilt! Please check our website for the fabric line! www.QuiltsOfValour.c

Blocks will be gathered and grouped for a quilt top. Quilters, quilting bees, guilds and anyone interested in completing a quilt is asked to register to complete a quilt and we will forward a set of blocks once we have a set from across the nation. You will be expected to complete the quilt, add borders if you wish, bind and label, include making a presentation case, or pillow case to go with the quilt. *Please do not make the quilt from all the blocks from your guild for this project.* We want to make **quilted hugs from across the nation!!**

Quilt shops are encouraged to make up a block pattern from their shop! Some are putting together a kit of the fabrics for the quilters to purchase, along with a free block pattern.

Please let us know who you are, and what part of the country you are from. We want to ensure each quilt made has blocks from coast to coast. *Please sign your block – with your region/city/town/guild name and your name too if you wish!!*

Vancouver Island - Marilyn Fuller

It has been a busy year for the Island QoV group starting in March with the Sewing Show thanks to the support of CanNorth Show Management. That brought in 21 quilts to add to the growing number we were collecting. Then it was on the Victoria Quilters' Guild Quilt Show and the Parksville Quilters' Guild Quilt Show again bringing in more quilts. Then five days at Ford Rodd Hill and Fisgard Lighthouse Historic Site and followed by Luxton Fall Fair. Overall we took in a total of 81 quilts with presentations of quilts to a Veterans House, to Veterans themselves and to the Navy.

We presented 12 quilts to Cockrell House for Veterans, 10 to the military, 56 to the Navy, and 3 to Veterans. We are scheduled to do a presentation at the West Shore Quilters' Guild in November and possible booth space at their show in March.

When we have done these shows we have tried to make it an interesting and educational event for both the public and the workers. So we are always talking to people about the quilts, about the additions to the main showing of Quilts of Valour. This we do by having some samples of Underground Railroad Quilts and Cot-to-Coffin quilts. All these types of quilts are related to conflict and war and how they helped or comforted the participants. We were thrilled when people asked questions and we heard comments like "I didn't know how important quilts have been throughout history, thank you so much for taking the time to explain". Or other comments like "I'll never look at a quilt again and just see a pretty blanket! Thank you for educating me".

In August, Carolyn Jennings, Fraser Valley Rep, delivered 20 quilts to Honour House in New Westminister. Honour House provides a temporary home for Canadian Forces personnel, veterans, first responders (ambulance paramedics, firefighters and police) and their families while they are receiving medical care and treatment in the Metro Vancouver area. Ten quilts were handed out to a representative of CFB Chilliwack for distribution both in Chilliwack and at CFB Jericho.

Hosting a Christmas dinner and dance for veterans of Camp Hill Hospital in Halifax has become a tradition at the “Earl Francis Spryfield Memorial” Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion Br.#152. The one held on December 15, 2011 was a very special event for all participants. The Camp Hill veterans were greeted by the Branch Executive and several members, then escorted to their tables in the main hall where they were treated to a turkey dinner, music, and entertainment.

Santa Claus paid a visit with gift bags for all. During the planning of this event Johanna Benning (NS QoV representative serving at the CF Recruiting Centre, Halifax) was contacted to inquire about the possibility of having quilts presented to the veterans. Johanna sent out the call to the QoV Western Ontario representative, Liz Seamans, who is also a member of the armed forces at CFB Borden. Between herself and Alison McDonald (SW Ontario representative) Liz managed to collect the quilts required, packed them up and shipped to Halifax by courier, arriving the day before the event. Johanna was able to attend the Christmas dinner and participate in the presentation of the quilts to each of the visiting veterans who were touched at



the recognition of the work that went into making each quilt. Many of the quilters who donate to QoV are relatives of returning Afghanistan veterans, some of which include a personal note or message embedded within the patterns and designs, all expressing our special thanks to all veterans in serving their country. Branch #152 offers their heartfelt thanks to the Quilts of Valour organization for their labours, their cheerful cooperation and respect for Canada's veterans.
